



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Christmas Cranberry Orange Bread

A December tradition in our family, this rich, buttery dessert bread has just the right balance of sweetness and tartness, and the red cranberries make it festive for the holidav. Cut into little slices so your guests can get a bite of something hearty and wholesome to balance out the sweet sugar cookies!

One recipe makes 1 large loaf. Double recipe makes 3 loaves.

2 cups whole wheat pastry flour

1½ tsp. baking powder

½ tsp. baking soda

1 tsp. sea salt

½ cup raw honey ½ cup butter (or 3 TBSP oil)

³/₄ cup orange juice

1 TBSP grated orange zest

34 cup chopped walnuts (optional)

2 cups fresh or frozen cranberries, coarsely chopped (don't pre-thaw)

Mix the dry ingredients together in a large bowl. Cut in the butter until mixture resembles coarse cornmeal. In a separate bowl, beat the egg and add the honey and orange rind until well mixed. Pour the wet ingredients into dry all at once and mix just until moistened. Fold in the nuts and berries. Pour into a greased 9" loaf pan. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hour. Knife inserted in center should come out clean. Let cool in the pan before removing from pan. Let sit overnight before slicing and so flavors set. Store in the refrigerator.


